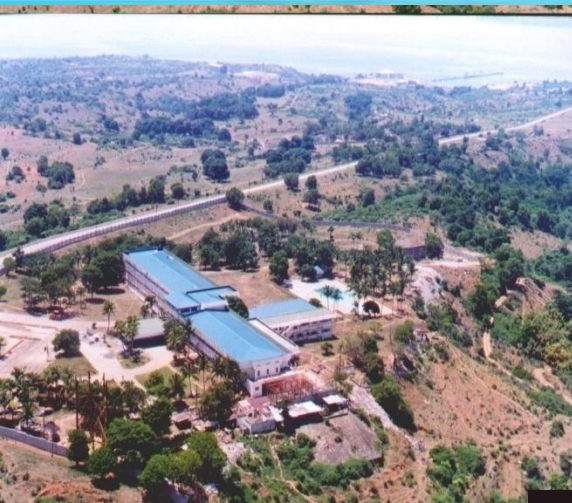

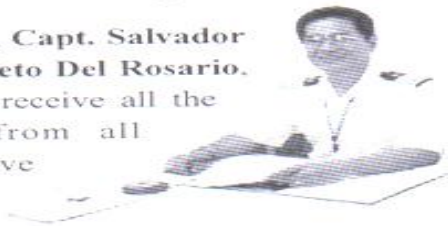

Any academic grievances or changes made are then forwarded to the President. 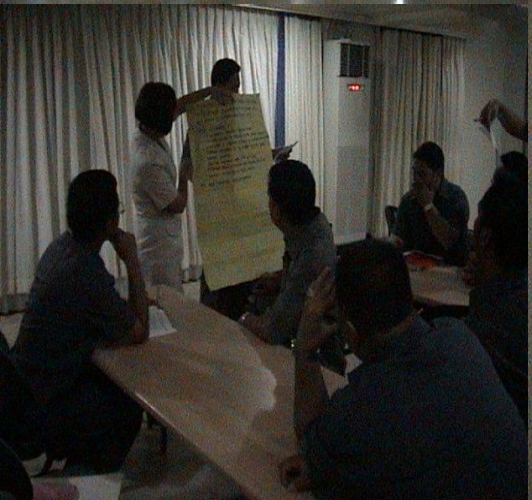

## My Brother After the Graduation

It turns out that my brother dreamt of becoming the president of our republic. How did I know? That was what he said when a writer interviewed him during their graduation day. It will seem for someone who does not know him that he is aiming a heavenly body from where he is standing right now. For most people, they will never expect by the mere looks of him that he was awarded four sabers namely the Vice Presidential Saber, for graduating number two among their class; the Chief-of-Staff Saber; the JUSMAG Saber; and the Philippine Air Force Saber, for graduating number one among the cadets who will join the Philippine Air Force. Not to mention the Leadership Award given by President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo-for him being the Brigade Commander, CCAFP-and scholarship. Now I ask you, will he be able to achieve it? We will see. One thing is for sure is that, we'll always be behind him.

This is my brother. He always aims for the highest. If there is a saying that "It is better to aim the moon then hit an eagle than aim an eagle then hit a stone," my brother believes that when a person aims the moon, he must do everything to hit nothing but the moon.

Baylon , the Research and Extension Services Director of MAAP as adviser.

The MRESC is composed of volunteer students who belong to the top echelon of the various class levels who are encouraged to conduct at least one research activity or project that would involve interested corps of midshipmen as part of their extracurricular activity. To prepare them with this challenging and yet an exciting task, the Department of Research and Extension Services in cooperation with the Academic Department conducted a 2- day Action Research Seminar Workshop to the MRESC members. The resource speakers were Dr. Angelica M. Baylon on "How to do an action research paper" and Ms. Janice K. Wakat on " basic statistics ". On the other hand, C/E Fred Centeno conducted an Echo Seminar about the topic " Enhancing Research Competencies in Various Disciplines ", whereas Ms. Ethel R. Capellan informed the MRESC members about the call for papers and its mechanics for the 16th International Maritime English Conference or IMEC 16th which MAAP shall co-host with the International Maritime Lecturers Association (IMLA) on October 26-29, 2004.

On March 6, 2004, the seminar- workshop continued and in the afternoon, the members of the MRESC presented their research proposals. Three (3) research proposals are being done by the underclassmen that are currently on shipboard training. They, together with their co-trainees from other maritime schools are accomplishing the questionnaires approved by their adviser. One of the accomplished researches will be presented at IMEC 16, the first time in the history of IMLA that a midshipman will be one of the paper presenters.

MRESC is the first Academic Club in MAAP whose officers are officially inducted to office by the President of MAAP. The MRESC members are: highly motivated to do researches in line with Adm. Santos' call for Maritime Research Networking. The members hope to link with other maritime schools for a research output that has a national impact for enhancement of maritime education and training (MET).

## MRESC PRESENTERS RECEIVE INTERNATIONAL AWARD

Long and hard work paid off as the Maritime Research and Extension Services Circle (MRESC) research presenters were awarded plaques that came all the way from New Zealand. Midn 1cl Odal, Teri Orlan and Midn 1cl Inong, Philip Albert Francis, president and vice president of the MRESC respectively, presented a research paper entitled "Attitude of MAAP Midshipmen Towards the Maritime Career Before and After Shipboard Training." The research was started 3 years ago after they had undergone a Seminar workshop on Action Research conducted by the DRES with an objective of enhancing their skills on doing research and for them to be able to produce research outputs.

Questionnaires were administered before the members of Class 2006 went on their Shipboard Training and were completed last year after their shipboard training in time for the AMETIAP 2005 Conference. With the help of the MRESC members, their adviser Dr. Angelica Baylon and statistician Ms. Janice Wacat, they were able to come up with an outstanding research work. The presentation was held at T/S Kapitan Felix Oca deck lecture room as it was sailing from Manila to Bataan. In front of foreign and local participants the two presenters gave an excellent delivery and defended their research with utmost confidence. The audience was greatly impressed and recommended the two be awarded as Best Presenters for this year's AMETIAP Conference. After the presentation, the delegates lined up to congratulate the two presenters specially the midshipmen's respective sponsoring company representatives from NYK-Fil and Bergesen.

The awards were given to them last January 16, 2006 by the MAAP president himself during the Morning Colors formation at the academy grounds. The president quoted that the same award was given to a USMMA staff three years ago and no one was awarded after that until now. He also added that the delegates were not only impressed of the manner they presented the research but also by the way they answered the questions and defended their work.

What follows is an overview of the research:

### INTRODUCTION

Filipino Seafarers today dominate the seven seas, sailing under the flags of different nations. They are widely recognized for their industry, dedication, adaptability, and reliability. This supremacy however is not permanent. It is being challenged by other countries with huge manpower surpluses such as China, India, Pakistan, Ukraine and other Central Asian republics willing to work for lower pay. If the Philippines is to retain its competitiveness in the global market, maritime schools of the country must pursue a successful maritime education and training that is at par with the world standards. As MAAP gears itself for this purpose, the success of the maritime industry will now lie on the success of the individual's career. The increasing demand for qualified and competent seafarers calls for maritime career aspirants not only with technical skills and knowledge but also with the right attitude and characteristics necessary for the profession.

### OBJECTIVES

The objective of this study is to present and compare the perceptions and attitudes of MAAP midshipmen, particularly the Class of 2006, towards seafaring before and after their shipboard training phase. Specifically, it seeks to identify the following: the plans and interests of the midshipmen before and after Shipboard Training, the significant difference on the attitudes and perception of the midshipmen before and after SBT, the significance of Shipboard Training to the plans and perceptions of the midshipmen towards a maritime career and to know the implications of this study for Development Programs of MET.

### METHODOLOGY

An open-ended questionnaire was used to obtain necessary data for the research and was administered to the 136 members of Class 2006 before their Shipboard Training. The questionnaire was validated based on the initial results gathered and again administered to the same respondents after coming from their sea phase training. Out of the total population only 117 results were considered valid for analysis ensuring the validity & reliability of comparisons. Frequency tables were produced using Statistical Packages for Social Sciences (SPSS) Software and data were analyzed through deferential & inferential tests (Proportion test "Z", 5-point Likert Scale, T-test and Chi square test).

### FINDINGS, IMPLICATIONS, CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATION

Generally, the whole study's objectives boil down to the importance of Shipboard Training and attitude formation of the MAAP midshipmen. As stated by dela Calzada, Hilario et.al. (2000), *"character formation for future seafarers must be given due regards by schools for maritime studies in preparation for a life of service on the sea."* Every individual who succeeds in the sea as a competent Filipino seafarer is a contribution in itself to the upliftment of the Philippines' stand as a reliable source of world-class seafarers. In meeting the ever-increasing demand for future competent officers, all factors affecting the attitude and perceptions of students must be considered.

## ROAD TO IMEC

The light is green for MAAP as it sails along with the International Maritime Lecturer's Association (IMLA) in launching one of the biggest events in the maritime training and education and a first time it would be held in the country. The 16<sup>th</sup> International Maritime English Conference.

The said event is an international gathering of maritime English educators, which was held at the Century Park Hotel in Manila, and partly at MAAP Kamaya Point, Mariveles Bataan in a four-day affair, which started on October 26, 2004.

Embodied in its theme "Safer Shipping and Cleaner Oceans Through Maritime English Proficiency" the activity aimed to propel the significance of maritime English proficiency in the Maritime Industry. The event featured workshops, forums and other interactive activities focusing on various subject matters concerning the status quo of the Maritime English language in the industry. Representatives from different maritime training and education institutions from all over the world convened so as to establish a network amongst themselves with the aim of looking forward for the assurance of maritime English proficiency.

### IMEC 16 AT MAAP

MAAP, hosting the event, formed a group of local organizers who worked hand in hand with IMLA officers in ensuring the success of the conference. Under the able leadership of VADM. Eduardo Ma R. Santos, (MAAP President) the local steering group with the chairmanship of Dr. Jesus Dela Rosa made the necessary preparation for the big event. Committees were formed as well who will work on the various operational concerns of the activity ranging from transportation, program preparations, tour arrangements, invitation of speakers and participants, venue set-up, to publicity and promotions of the said event.

Most of the fora was held at the Century Park Hotel in Manila, with Plenary and parallel sessions on specified dates. The local steering group arranged city tours for the guests and participants. Speakers were invited and scheduled presentations were set-up, which will be presented in all the sessions. Part of the four-day affair was a visit to the Academy, with a parade and review, which impressed the guests and participant on the third day of the activity.



### MORE THAN JUST A HOST

It was not only on the physical arrangements of the activity did MAAP took a lion's share of the workload, much was also prepared by the Academy in substantiating the whole event. The Academy conducted presentations concerning its innovative efforts in keeping quality instructions in terms of maritime English subjects. MAAP instructors and even the President himself promoted the various means of MAAP in giving quality Maritime English instructions. Likewise, representatives from the midshipmen fleet made their presentation as well, on an event which happened for the first time in the history of IMEC.

Presenting first for MAAP were Vadm Eduardo Ma.R. Santos and Dr. Angelica Baylon, with a paper on "IMEC 16 at MAAP: Towards Ensuring Full support and Cooperation by Local Stakeholders". They presented a research on the various endeavors of the academy in stepping up the quality of its maritime education and training through research developments initiated by MAAP. The motivation given by the Academy to its constituents has resulted in a concerted effort for more productive output with

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research as a channel. Likewise, they also talked about how MAAP has expanded the realms of its research development by initiating a structuralized network with other MET institutions thus creating a mutual relationship with them in terms of education and training. Similarly, MAAP's effort of bringing its counterparts to work on a common cause has been defined further by bringing IMEC in the country which offered a rare opportunity for the local MET institutions to convene and interact with their counterparts overseas and create a network of ideas and practices which on this event will focus more on Maritime English. Through IMEC, MAAP has brought the country closer to the rest of the world.

On the other hand, Dr Jesus Dela Rosa (SAC Languages and Social Sciences area, Senior lecturer, Lead Coordinator, IMO Model courses 6.09 and 3.12) and Ms. Gladys Limson (English Language Lecturer) also presented a research entitled "A Proposed Curriculum in Standard Marine Communication Phrases (SMCP) for Philippine Maritime Education and Training institutions" wherein they talked about a research finding through a survey conducted, with regards to the "particular usefulness" of the Standard Marine Communication Phrases (SMCP) in the maritime working environment. Moreover, the presentation included as well a proposal of a curriculum that will ensure the satisfaction of the educational needs of Maritime students in terms of the maritime English subject.

On the last day of the conference, Ms Ethel R. Capellan M.A.T., the Academy librarian presented a

research entitled "Library Resources for Maritime English In Selected Maritime Academies in Region III of the Philippines" wherein she talked about the relevance and importance of library resources for an effective Maritime English.

Likewise, Ms Jane Japitana (Lecturer) shared a research on the teaching of the SMCP on board T/S Kapitan Felix Oca, wherein she discussed about teaching Maritime English effectively by staging the learning process within the vicinity of their working environment such as a training ship. On the presentation, Ms. Japitana shared the effectivity of administering the Maritime English subject among MAAP cadets, on board the training ship where a hands-on application of the topic is achieved.

Lastly, representing the Midshipmen Fleet were Midn. 1cl Zoniko Tolentino and Midwn. 1cl Maria Cristina Javellana on their research presentation entitled "The Relevance of the Standard Marine Communication Phrases (SMCP) to Marine Transportation and Marine Engineering Cadets of the Maritime Academy of Asia and the Pacific Kamaya Point Philippines". This presentation included the perception of the students of MAAP toward the maritime English subject. It shows as well how the cadets look at the applicability of the said course on the profession. 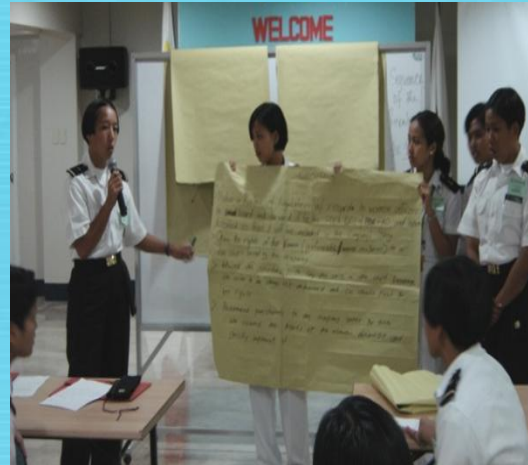

In order to educate and uphold women's rights, and to disseminate information, women's seminar on Republic Act 9262 (otherwise known as Anti-Violence Against Women And Their Children Act of 2004) was held last August 20, 2004 at the AMOSUP Convention Hall, Manila. This was attended by various women groups from NYK, PANTALAN, NETSHIP, PAR, PSU, AMOSUP and MAAP.

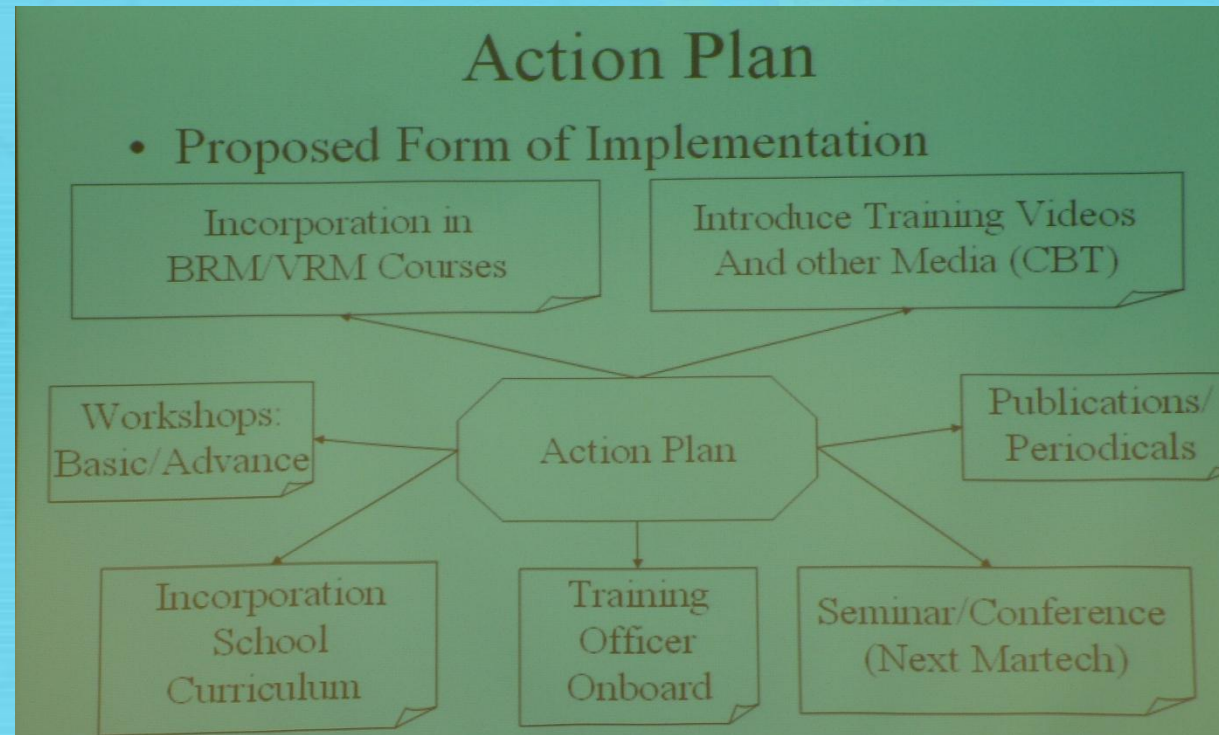

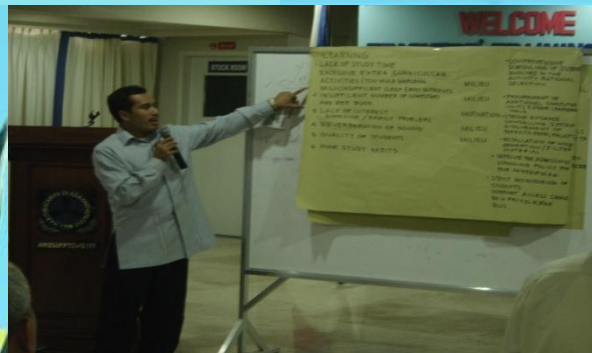

Due to the increasing demands of some sponsoring shipping companies, the usual input of 150 cadets was increased to 200 for this batch.

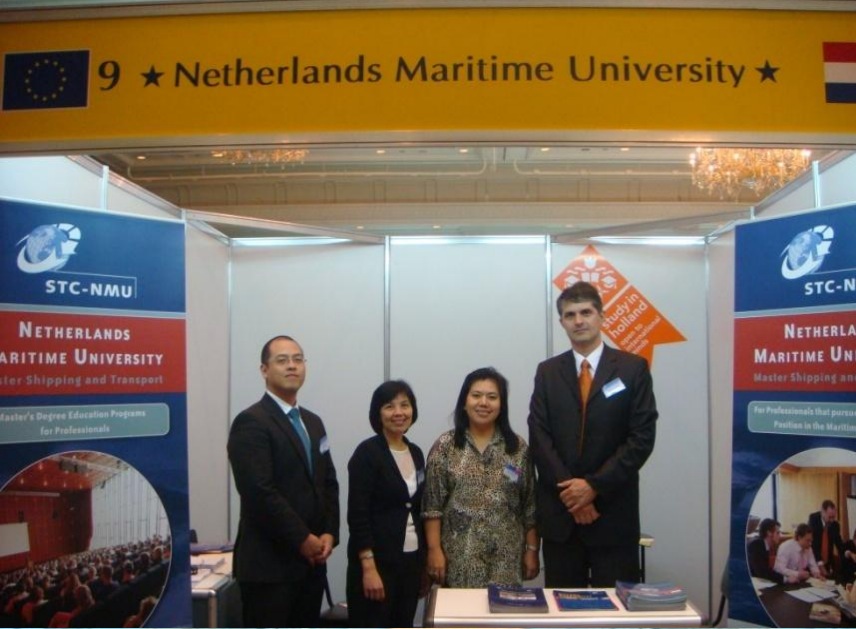

## Finest maritime university

In his keynote address, His Excellency Stale Torstein Risa – Norway Ambassador to the Philippines said, "maritime schools must adopt their own procedures and practices."

"At this juncture, it is natural to revert to John B. Lacson Foundation Maritime University – a school that has always demonstrated both willingness and the ability to learn and adapt, depending on changing

programs as the mode of delivery – distance education will be developed. She noted though JBLFMU is way ahead in this area.

According to Ms. Fernandez, some of CHED's best practices and initiatives include participatory leadership and management, facing issues and concerns promptly and honestly, welcome new developments, annual monitoring and assessment of all maritime institutions, moratorium on the opening of new maritime programs, iden-

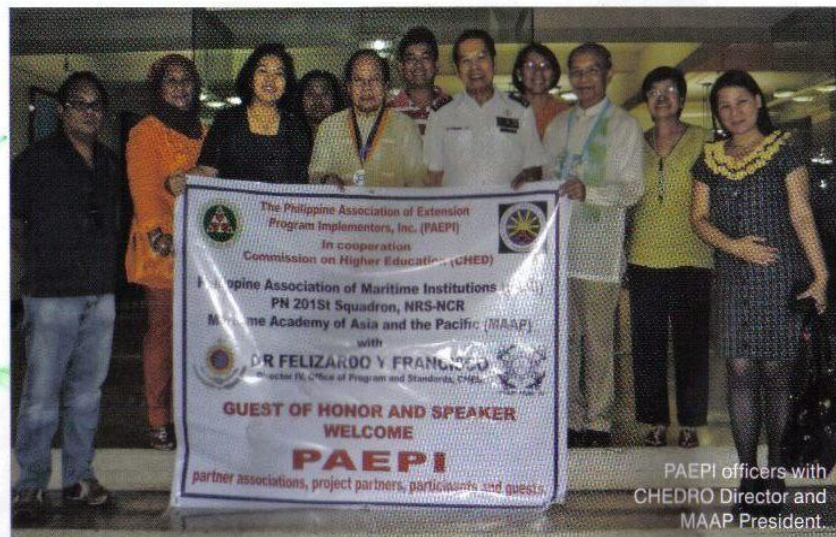

"I am a witness to the growth of this association from the time it was established and nurtured to become what it is now in Region III," he said proudly.

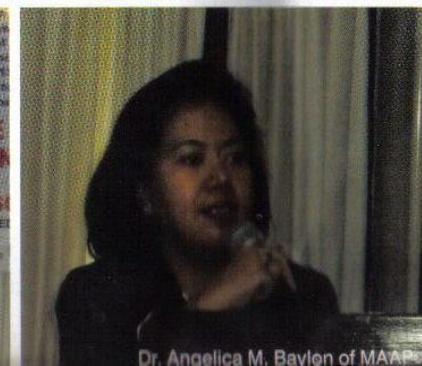

"Every great endeavor has a price tag. The greater the job, the higher the price; the price tag is known as commitment," concluded Dir. Francisco.

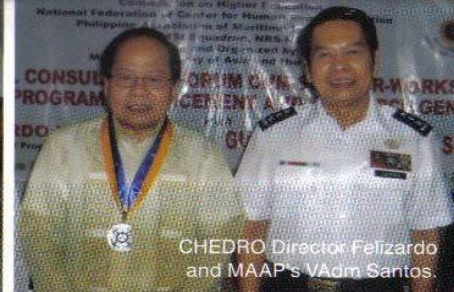
#### End Poverty by 2015

Ms. Dulce Marie P. Saret, National MDG Campaign and Advocacy Specialist of the United Nation Millennium Resident Coordinators Office, explained that the MDG is to "end poverty by 2015."

According to her, all 189 UN – member states have pledged to uphold eight (8) millennium goals. First and foremost is to

eradicate extreme poverty and hunger by 2015. It aims to reduce by half the proportion of people living on less than a dollar a day. It aims to reduce by half the proportion of people who suffer from hunger.

Second is to achieve universal primary education. It aims to ensure that all boys and girls complete a full course of primary schooling. Next is to promote gender equality and empower women. This is to eliminate gender disparity in primary and secondary education preferably by 2005 and at all levels by 2015.

Fourth is to reduce child mortality by two thirds the mortality rate among children under five. Next is to improve maternal health by reducing to three quarters the maternal mortality ration and to have universal access to reproductive health.

The sixth MDG is to combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases. It aims to put a stop and begin to reverse the spread of the dreaded disease and likewise, to halt and begin to reverse the incidence of malaria and other major diseases.

The next one is to ensure environmental sustainability. This is integrating the principles of sustainable development into country policies and programs and to reverse loss of environmental resources. It also aims to reduce by half the proportion of people without sustainable access to safe drinking water; and to achieve significant improvement in the lives of at least 100 million slum-dwellers by 2020.

IN the wake of the devastation inflicted by tropical cyclones "Ondoy" and "Pepeng" on the Philippines, a lawmaker has urged the Department of Finance (DOF) to remove the documentary stamp tax on the remittances of overseas Filipinos.

"In view of the latest calamity, we ask the (DOF), through the Bureau of Internal Revenue, to defer the imposition and collection of taxes imposed on OFW's remittances," Senate President Juan Ponce Enrile said in a press statement.

Enrile said the remittances of Filipinos abroad are charged with a stamp tax of P0.30 for every P200 sent to the country, as required in the Tax Reform Act of 1997.

Removal of the DST, he said, would alleviate the lives and ease some of the financial burden of the

victims of the typhoons.

The senate president added that the possible revenue loss from the DST can be compensated by the influx of foreign currency from Filipinos abroad who would choose to send money home through the legal channels.

In 2008, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) recorded an all-time high overseas Filipino remittances of \$16.43 billion. An estimated 8-9 million Filipinos, migrants and contract worker, and their dependents, are abroad. Tens of thousands more are joining the swelling ranks in search of better-paying jobs.

Last year alone, a total of 1,376,823 Filipino workers were deployed abroad, the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA) said.

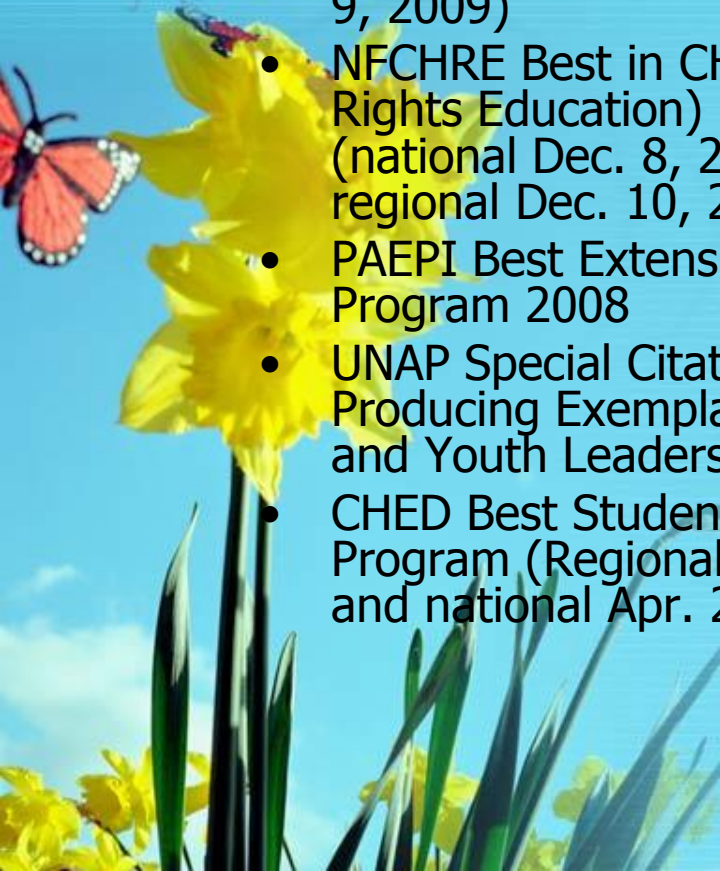

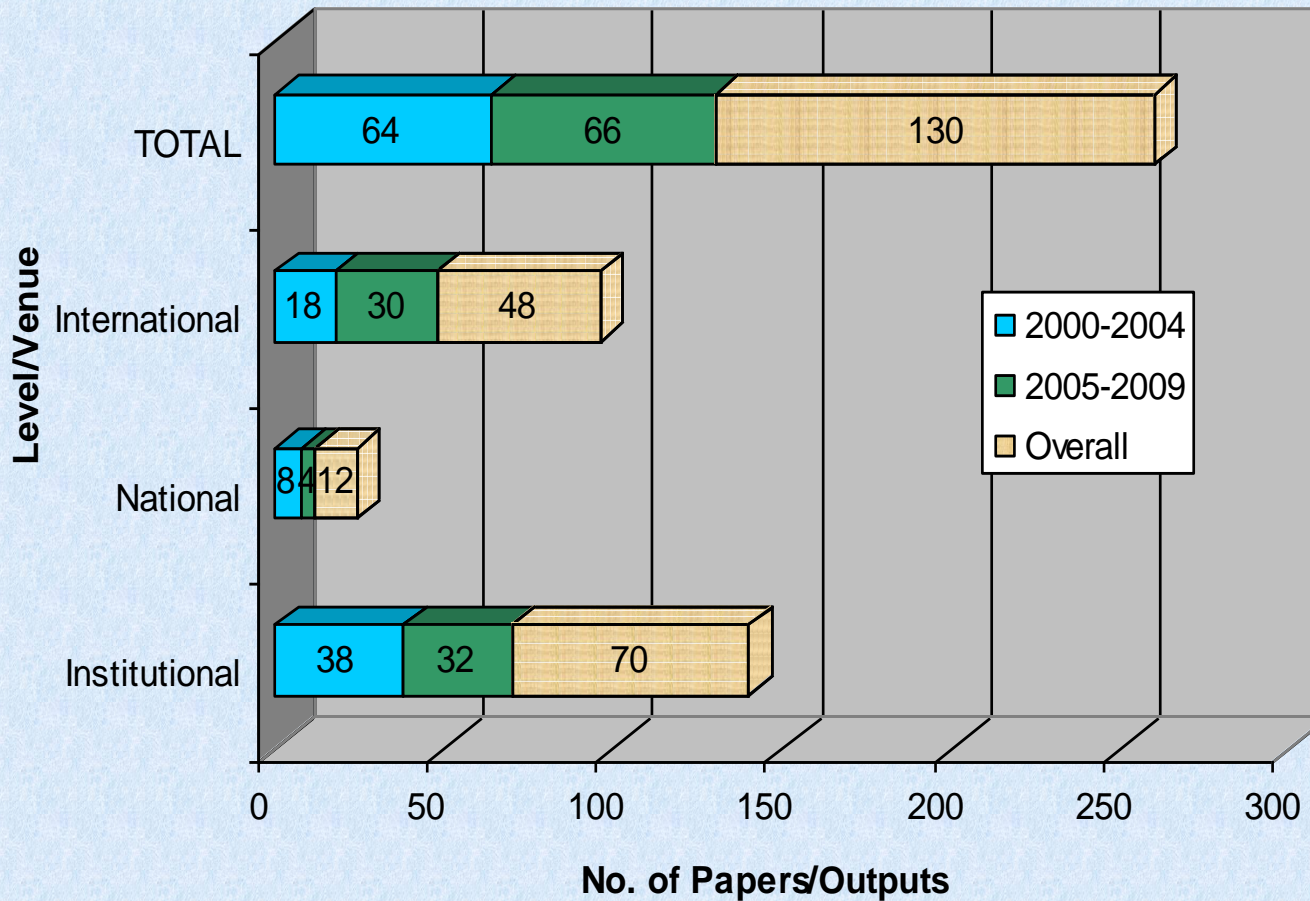

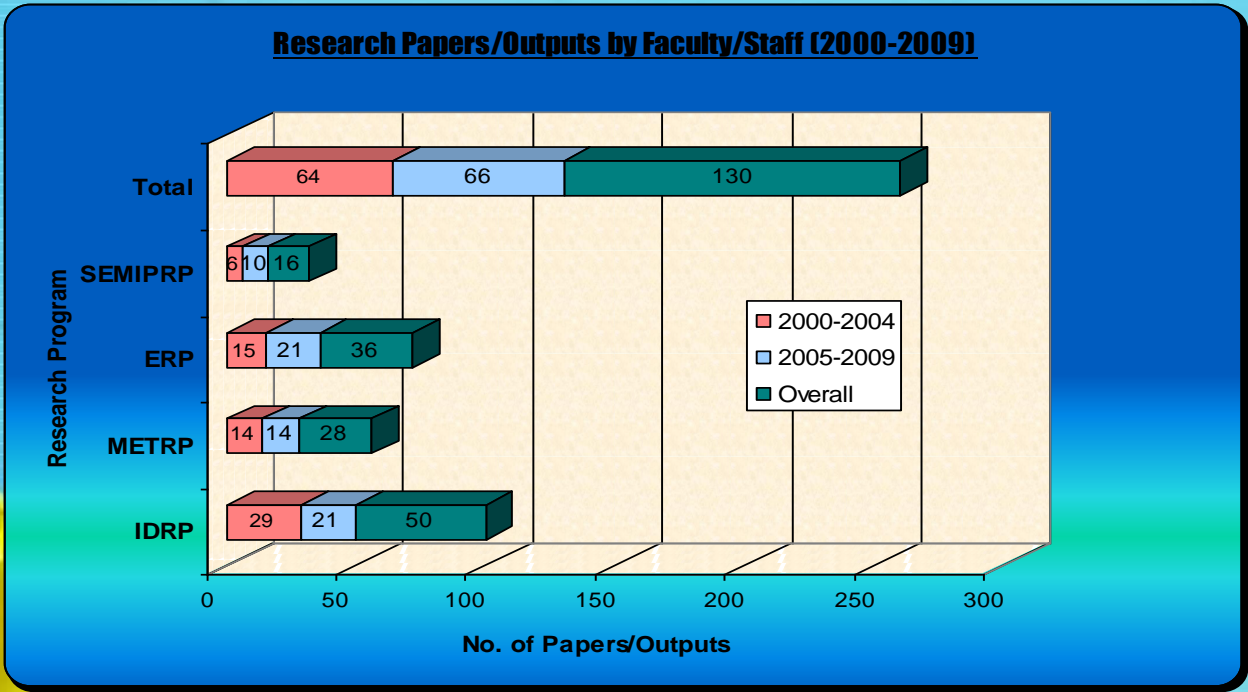
